

Member Biopics

Paul Collins -

About 20 years ago, I borrowed an MZ125 from my brother, to do my cbt on and see if I liked riding before I bought my own bike. It soon turned into a keep fit hobby as I ended up pushing the bike nearly as much as I rode it, so I gave it back.

Three years ago I kept talking to people about wanting to ride but never did anything about it until as part of my Christmas present in 2013, I had my cbt paid for and decided to do the direct access and go straight for my full license. I started mid January 2014 and had 2hr lessons on a Saturday morning when I could, then passed my test at the beginning of March.



As a birthday treat I went bike shopping 4 days after passing. After driving round quite a few dealers in all parts of Yorkshire I ended up at Team Roberts in Doncaster and bought a Triumph Sprint 955st. I moved to Scunthorpe to be with my partner. I knew very few people and only 1 other person that rode, so I was limited to going on ride outs, but by chance I was told about S&S bikers who were local to me so I got in touch and started to ride out with them. This helped me to gain experience through the ride outs and also advice from others. This also increased my social circle, and we not

only enjoy ride outs together, but numerous social events.

After 5 months I was still fairly cautious and not that confident on cornering. I was given the opportunity to have an IAM taster session led by Ian Morrison. I was not sure what to expect and if I'm honest I was extremely apprehensive prior to the ride. I did not consider myself experienced enough to ride at this level. I lacked confidence and only chose to ride when it was dry & light, on roads that I was familiar with.

True to his pre-ride briefing Ian took us on roads that tested our skill, ability and nerve. This challenged me to step out of my comfort zone. The conditions changed throughout the ride, deteriorating with rain and darkness falling. The opportunity to follow an experienced rider as Ian, following his direction, positioning and lines, gave me the confidence to ride safely and progressively



on roads that I would never have attempted previously. It changed the way I ride, and I was no longer restricted by road, light or weather conditions. I decided I would do the full IAM test but I would wait until winter had passed before starting.

I also had the opportunity to further my skills by doing a 1 day and a 2 day BikeSafe course arranged by Dave Butt, plus a performance plus day at Cadwell Park.



In March 2015, after having lots of problems with the ST, I decided to change my bike and bought a Sprint GT 1050.

As spring came I started my observed rides with Dave Butt, but due to changes in his shift patterns he was not able to continue. Due to numerous reasons I had the chance to ride out with several observers (John Harrison, Malcolm Heaton & Ian Morrison) gaining experience from each and everyone of them. The observed rides were very varied and sometimes challenging as the weather changed dramatically on a couple of them, where we ended up riding in heavy rain and on one occasion we had sun, rain and snow all in the space of the 3 hour ride. I valued the experience that my observers shared and went on to pass my test with a 1st.

The confidence and experience that I have gained has allowed me to take part and also lead longer rides out,

including taking part in the Macmillan sunset to sunrise ride in June 2015 covering over 700 miles in 43 hours. I also did the same route in March 16 but the second time over the Easter bank holiday weekend with pillions too. The weather again was very varied and started off on a sunny day, followed by day of rain, hurricane winds, snow and also taking in roads that were very challenging.

I feel that taking the skills for life course has helped me gain further skills and understanding to make me a better rider, and at every opportunity I promote the course to anyone wishing to improve their riding skills

Paul Coulson -

Just last week I had my birthday and turned 56. I started riding bikes at about the age of 12/13. I was brought up in Scunthorpe and my dad, as a bit of a hobby, more than anything, used to buy cheap motorbikes of small cc's, "do them up" and sell them on.

I don't think he ever made much money but it gave him something to do in his garage. I was made chief test rider. So I used to go out on them after placing the back wheel in the wheel trolley. (it was illegal to have the back wheel on the road if it wasn't taxed, tested and insured..) and take them down the local waste ground and ride them round reporting any poor running, rubbish brakes or general slopiness. I also had a field bike which was usually a Honda 90 chopped. Everything was removed that was removable and the exhaust sliced off as short as we dare go. (This often blacked the toe part of everyones shoes/boots.) The track in the field was mainly mud where the grass had been worn out and some of the older ones amongst our biking group could get these 90's to scrape their pegs which often resulted in a major crash. Solid pegs.

My pocket money every week was spent on petrol and riding in the field so we only came home on a weekend evening for something to eat, or a bandage or plaster.

Some of this is probably wrong, but it's how I remember it! Petrol went up to about 50p a gallon not long after decimalisation and ration books were issued. These were never used as I found out after sneakily ripping one out of my dad's ration book to get more petrol. This was my hobby now and nothing was going to stop my riding. The woman at the petrol station up the road told me to keep it as they weren't being used yet and I had to tell my dad that I had nicked it because it was ripped out from the ration book in the kitchen drawer. Whack.

The worst bike out of all the ones I rode around this time was a James scooter. Two single seats and a footbrake. The best was a red Suzuki 100 or 125 with 4 gears.

I turned 16 on the 4th August 1976 and my insurance started at 6am so at 5 mins to 6 I sat on the drive, being held back by my worried mum, on my German made Autovap ??????? waiting for the green light to go.

The arm was raised and off I went with no idea of road sense other than my cycling test......I ran out of petrol at lunch and then realised I had no idea where I was. The nearest phone box and a local, summonsed my mate on his CB200 with a petrol can tied on his back seat and off we went again. I arrived home around 6pm, 2 petrol stops later, to find my mum in tears wondering where the hell I had been and my dad pacing around saying "I knew he'd be alright" The bike was quite rubbish really and when it failed its MOT on worn front forks I was quite happy.

I upgraded to a Garelli Tiger Cub and made it all the way to Wakefield one weekend to see some relatives. A few fizzers later and various mopeds and I was totally hooked. I stayed on smallish stuff until the 250cc law came in where you couldn't ride anything over 125 on L plates so decided I needed to take my test. I took my test in Collingham as a 2 parter in 1988 and then had all sorts of bikes from a basic 250 superdream to a Ducati 748. KIR 650 Vfr1200. I counted 32 bikes so I won't bore you with all the details.

I changed my job in 1990 which meant travelling to Lincoln on a CB900 until we moved 4 years later. Currently I ride a Vfr800 and have been round the Black Forest, Luxembourg, France and often ride to Switzerland to stay with my brother who lives there.

A few mates from work wanted a "long bike trip" and I somehow ended up as the organiser so we did the 6 country tour staying in Formula 1's. We set off for the ferry one Friday and did.... England, France, Belgium, Luxembourg, Germany and Holland and arrived back on the Sunday evening, all 12 of us all in one piece and happy.

The diversity of the people who ride bikes and the types of bikes available will never cease to amaze me and we can often just sit and watch the people and their bikes passing by on one of the many Lincolnshire Bike Nights that we attend.

I often get asked to take someone out on the back of my bike who has never done it before and will show them the pleasures of biking without trying to scare them.

We can all do stupid things on bikes that give bikers a bad name and the only real gripe I have is poor protection, oh, and a no gloves, is a definite no-go.

Daily I ride to work on a CRF250L all year through rain, sleet and snow and use the Vfr800 as my weekend touring bike for me and my wife.

p.s. I quite fancy the new Africa Twin but don't tell her......Last bike, last bike, last bike, blah, blah, blah.

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Mobile Bike Tyres

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Rambling on

John Harrison

Some time ago Lynne asked for a piece on an unusual job or hobby, but nobody has replied. I suppose, like me, you have had just common garden jobs and just do the usual hobbies. Or is it that nobody wants to share their private free time leisure pursuits with us, which is quite understandable.

But what is unusual? What is matter of fact to me might be quite usual to someone else. So, what does the dictionary say about a hobby, an occupation, pursuit or pastime especially in ones leisure?

For myself, I have done many things to keep me entertained in my own leisure time, none of them I would consider a hobby as such. As a kid I drew and coloured, collected many things; stamps, coins, tea cards, cigarette boxes and cards, match box labels as well as things that would be frowned upon today; butterflies, birds eggs, pressed wild flowers. Other pastimes where gardening, growing vegetables and cacti, designing, planting and looking after a large shrubbery that provided flower, colour, scent and structure thoughout the year. Also, there was the tinkering with push bikes, All these things were pastimes, but were they hobbies? Most of these were to keep us occupied since there was no TV or computer games to bury our heads in.

A lot of these dropped by the wayside after I left school. The push bike eventually gave way to one with an engine. Over the years I have incorporated a few other pastimes into the biking. The wild flowers have remained, not pressing them, but I spent many an hour and rode miles looking for them, in Lincolnshire that is, to see if they were still managing to survive with the modern way of land management. That's one reason for getting an off road bike, to go where the road bike could not, it's surprising when in the middle of nowhere how after a few words to explain why I was riding there, opened new tracks when I was shown where I might find what I was looking for. Another little pastime was finding all the remaining fords (no not the blue badge type) left in Lincolnshire. I not sure, but I think I must have ridden through the vast majority of them. Also, I combined another little task with the fords and that was to ride all the roads, lanes, tracks, or in one case, a ploughed field in the north end of old Lincolnshire. If you drew a line from Skegness to Newark, everything north of that to the Humber, this area covered roughly the northern Natural History Divisions for the flora of Lincolnshire.

But other things have come and gone, the drawing became water colours, I still have some of my cacti plants left and I still like to grow my own vegetables. I have had a go at many things to pass the time, raising plates and bowls from sheet copper and acid etching on copper plate, also acid etching on glass. I like working with wood, I've done some carving and turning. I also like making things out of pallets, all sorts of things; two full sized five-bar gates, an owl box, chicken coops and sheds, numerous bird boxes, a half barrel log basket, a third scale planter based on an old fashioned wheelbarrow complete with wooden whee,I plus a few more. What I am planning next is a cart-wheel and, if successful,I a model haywain.

When needs must I've repaired sea-grass and split-cane seats, done tapestry for stool covers and fire screens, even embroidered covers, re-upholstered chairs, in one case made a miniature chesterfield settee for a wedding present and repaired two grandfather clocks.

Another thing I like doing is to maintain my own vehicles and work on the odd mechanical things. Just recently I've brought back into life an Allen self-propelled Motor Scythe, fitted with a Villiers two stroke engine, a grass cutter if you were wondering. I could go on but you get the idea, I do a lot of things with my free leisure time but are they my hobbies?

And just to bring an end to my ramblings, for the last 35 years I have been an observer for our group, training up riders to a standard that is good enough to pass their IAM advanced motorcycle test. Whilst gaining many hour of pleasure doing it, you could hardly call it a hobby could you?
