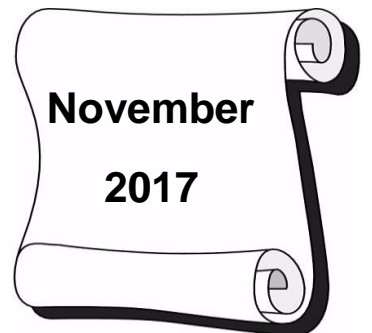
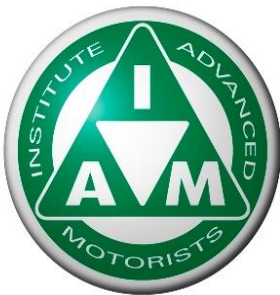

October's social



John Siddle – Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership Communications Manager

John started out in the Air Force, had a tour as the Chief Airframe Engineer for the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight. Following a collision involving family members where the investigation of the cause was very minimal, John started to take a keen interest in road safety and the opportunity to work with Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership came on his retirement from the Forces. John now works closely with the investigation team and families who suffer loss on the road, lessons are learnt, and all fatal and serious collisions are fully investigated

John deals with all the publicity and communications relating to work by the LRSP. This helps to keep it consistent. Members are the Police, Fire, Ambulance services and the Local Authority. They all work together to make things better, not just in our county but countrywide.

Like all large associations the LRSP are judged on their figures by the media and, unfortunately, last year was the worst year for killed and seriously injured in over 10 years. Anything the association can do to make it safer on the roads is a must. John thanked IAM for all the effort and hard work they have done to make our roads safer.

The presentation covered everything from observation of the road, planning an overtake, judging a bend, using a mobile phone and the use of speed cameras. A subject close to all our hearts! The most common causes of collisions were caused by the lack of skill of the rider or the “look but fail to see” of a driver. John’s presentation had examples of collisions and discussions were held over what could be seen, what should be assumed, and how should you respond. He reiterated the adage, “Don’t fixate on a vehicle/object as you will hit it.” Assess the area and plan your escape route. A lot of car drivers don’t see a bike as a threat, unlike a lorry. Riders should use lateral movement to bring themselves to others attention. “Roll off 10” means slow down on approach to a junction, the vehicles goes from a 2.7 second stop to a 4.5 second stop and gives other users $\frac{3}{4}$ second more to see you.

Everyone does the pre-ride checks when setting off for a ride, but how many do them to come home? How far you have travelled and the road surface can all have had an effect on your bike.

Lincolnshire, in particular, is a very rural area with all the problems this can create. Be aware of mud on the road, cuttings into the grass verge or breaks in hedges that could be entrances into fields, or could have tractors turning out. Check as far ahead as you can looking over fields and hedges, there may be a tractor turning right up ahead. Don’t take bends too fast and watch when filtering. As you’ve all heard our observers say “Expect the unexpected!”

If using a phone on a motorised vehicle the rule is that it should only be a one button press to activate. It should automatically go on speaker. If more than one button is pressed and a collision occurs then you can be charged with careless driving.

And Speed Cameras....everyone hates them but they are only used as a last solution, where engineering is not viable or cost effective sometime a camera is the only solution. Anyone who receives a speeding ticket and gets a fine is paying money into the treasury; however, if you are offered a place on a speed awareness course then the course fee is put back into road safety, both new schemes, campaigns, initiatives for vulnerable groups and teaching courses, particularly in schools.

A very interesting presentation with a good discussion and question and answer session.

MY JOURNEY TO BECOME AN ADVANCED RIDER

Robert Cross:

I had been contemplating doing the IAM Advanced Riders course for about 3 years. I regularly saw the Group Gazebo and good looking volunteers offering information on what the group was all about but every time I committed the sin of procrastination. Early 2017 I came across the IAM Group one sunny day, set up and looking splendid all offering their advice and experience at the Waddington WAVE early. They had set up a slow moving course using bollards that riders could attempt. It was even a competition and 1st prize was a piece of soft luggage for a motorbike. I like a competition and I was looking for a new piece of luggage. I was one of the 1st to do the course and very quickly became aware that my riding skills were not as good as I thought. My performance was not good and I knew that I was going to have to buy that new piece of luggage.

After finding out that I did not win, I procrastinated no more. On the same week I had completed the forms and paid my money to do the course and had to sit on the fence, wait to be contacted. It did not take long. My Observer was Kev Hewson and we very

quickly organised our first ride.

I was surprised at how much I had to learn. Kev took it all in his stride and beat me into shape quickly. I progressed through the course learning new skills every week, I could feel the improvement and my riding was taken to a new level.

Eventually Kev told me that it was time to do a check test and he had it organised. This was when I met Jerry. I think he sensed my nervousness and he made me feel at ease immediately. We set off and used roads I did not know existed. I very quickly forgot I was on a check test and just enjoyed the ride using all of my newly learnt skills. At the end Jerry gave me the good news and suggested I apply for my test.

Unfortunately for me I peaked at the wrong time. I was leaving soon on a planned bike trip to Normandy for the 75th anniversary of the DDay Landings. Not to worry though I would do my test shortly after I returned.

The trip to Normandy was great. I had the opportunity to use all my new skill in France. At first it was difficult as they drive on the wrong side of the road so using my IAM Roadcraft felt strange but it was exciting.

When we returned from France I had ridden over 1200 miles using my new Roadcraft Skills. I could not restart my training immediately as life got in the way as it does. A few months had gone by since I last saw Kev and I missed him lots. We arranged for a few sessions while my test application was being processed.

I am pleased to say that on completion of my test, I achieved a First. I have Kev to thank as his patience and effort helped me all the way.

Shortly after my test I embarked on a Bike trip to west coast of Scotland, visiting Fort William, Isle of Skye, Applecross and Perth. Another 1400 miles of sheer pleasure.

The Advanced Course has changed the way I ride. I do believe it has made me safer and my riding fun.

Oh Deer!

Riders need to be extra vigilant in parts of the country where deer are common, as this is the time of year when they are more likely to stray onto road. During the rutting season, deer are on the move and riders are urged to be careful. October is breeding time, and that means deer will be more prevalent. Deer are at their most active during the rutting season at dawn and dusk, so their activity coincides with times when the roads are at their busiest, through the morning and evening rush hours.


There are more than two million deer in the UK, and research which suggests that around 75,000 are involved in vehicle collisions each year, with 10,000 deer killed as a result. The human death toll from deer collisions ranges between 10 and 20 annually, and industry estimates put the cost of damage to vehicles to be at least £17m. Some advice to riders to reduce risk from deer collisions which include: taking note of deer warning signs and being ready to encounter a deer at very short notice; dipping headlights because deer are more likely to 'freeze' in full beam.
