

The AGM of Lincolnshire Advanced Motorcyclists took place at the November social. A very good turn out as well. Mick Smith discussed the past year and congratulated everyone on how successful the group had been.

He then went on to state that it had been a good year for new members and test passes. In the 12 months up to November 1st, 30 new members had joined. This is up from last year and is hopefully partly due to the open day we ran again in April, our presence at the BikeFest and the IAM's campaign to make themselves a household name!


23 test passes in past 12 months with 15 being Firsts! And only one fail. Overall Pass rate is up to 96% which is above the region average of 91%. We currently have 19 associates working towards the test although 2 do have tests booked for later in this month and 3 are on hold.

So far during this year, we have had little reason to be concerned about the group's finances and we are currently in line to finish this tax year with similar results to 2016/17. The group, of course, does not exist to make profits but as long as we can keep any deficits (or surpluses) as close to zero as possible, we should be ok financially for the foreseeable future. Of course, this relies on us continuing to attract new members but I have no doubts that we will continue to do just that.

Mick Smith confirmed that the annual subscription fee would be maintained at £8.00.



Neal Newnham

My IAM RoadSmart story started when I returned to biking after a near 30 year absence from the riding scene.

I first passed my test when I was 17 years old but gave up motorbiking at the age of 19 when I joined the RAF. Over the last 30 years I considered returning to biking many times but never did, until one day I was invited by a colleague to rent a Harley with him and tour a little bit of California for the weekend. That experience re-ignited my passion and I started to rent bikes in the US and South Africa whenever my business trips allowed. These trips, to some of the most amazing places in the world, inspired me to want to own a bike again.

I finally took the plunge and bought a R1200GS, a bike I had learned to love whilst renting, and

promised myself that I would seek expert tuition once my new bike arrived. I examined all of the available training options, had a few lessons with local instructors, but decided that I needed more. Ultimately, I wanted to be a safer rider and to me that meant passing my advanced motorcycle test. That's why I contacted LAM and that's where my IAM RoadSmart story began.

On joining I was allocated Alison Millington as my observer. I cannot praise Alison enough for the way in which she conveyed to me the art of the advanced rider. I must admit that I was a slow learner and for me the light bulb moment came when I followed Alison for the first time; there it was, a clear example as to what an advanced rider looked like. With Alison's patience and exceptional tuition (it felt so much more than observing) I finally managed that pass.

My thanks clearly go to Alison, and also to Ken Rose for his wise words and vast experience.

I would thoroughly recommended IAM and the LAM group to anyone interested in making themselves a safer rider.

For me, the journey continues and I look forward very much to continuing my mini-expeditions but also, and most importantly, to starting with LEBBS in the coming weeks.

In A Man's World

After passing my Advanced test in September 2016, it was suggested by an IAM examiner that I should consider becoming an Observer.

I dismissed the idea fairly quickly and it wasn't until some months later when it was mentioned again. With encouragement from Smiler, I plucked up courage to enquire. The thought of being a female in such a male dominated environment was extremely daunting and somewhat intimidating.

Shortly after I was contacted by John Cheetham to advise me that Ken Rose had been appointed as my National Observer/Mentor and told he would be in touch. What had I done? Did I really want to step into this Man's World, that is the IAM?

A check ride was arranged with Ken to confirm that my riding skills where still of the standard required for the role. Ken put me at ease and we had an enjoyable ride through the Lincolnshire Wolds, taking in the road through Wold Newton which I was to learn was a favourite route of his.

I joined Ken a few days later to follow him and his associate on their first ride out together. There seemed so much to learn and take on board.

A Sunday morning training session was arranged for all trainee Observers to attend. We met up at Middle Rasen for a briefing and to be paired with a qualified observer. When I arrived there was approximately 12 other bikes already there. Again all men, I started to doubt myself and the nerves crept in. Would I be accepted?

The ride went really well and we ended at Caistor Lakes for coffee and cake, which is always a bonus. My nerves and fears had totally disappeared. The observer team were a great mix of personalities and I was pleased and proud to be part of it.

During this time I was allocated my first associate, Neal Newnham. What a pleasure it was to see Neal improve his skills and take on board the suggestions and advice we discussed after each ride out. On 27th October Neal took his test and passed. Well done Neal.

Thank you to all the observer team for welcoming me into the fold. Let's hope more women come to join us and enjoy the experience as much as I have.


was a surprise as it had been quite chilly before we set off.



Observers and Associate Information

Jerry Neale

Fifteen Observers travelling from all over the county and over the border braved the minus temperatures to attend this months Observers meeting at LK2 in Nettleham. Many Items were discussed throughout the evening. Two Observers will be planning a subject of the month for the next meeting in February. Many of the team are still out on the road working with their associates. Valued skills and knowledge can still be gained when winter riding.

This month the Observer team would like to congratulate Ian Firth and Phil Niner with completing their IMI Local Observer qualification.

If you are planning any rides during the winter consider a look at the Lincs county council gritting routes to plan your ride. If heading out of the county consider looking for similar information from other county councils.

Gritting routes

The county council grits 1,869 miles of priority roads in Lincolnshire when road temperatures drop to around 1°C. This includes:

- All A and B roads
- At least one road from each of the county's main villages to a major traffic route
- At least one road within 500m of all train and bus stations, hospitals and schools,
- where possible
- Additional roads depending on various risk factors, such as historic accident data

The Highways Agency is responsible for gritting all trunk roads in Lincolnshire, including on the A1, the A52 Grantham to Nottingham and the A46 west of Lincoln. No other roads will be treated, except during severe snow or prolonged icy spells. We do not routinely grit or salt footpaths. However, during severe weather, we work closely with local organisations to clear some steep and well-used pavements. There is no law preventing people from clearing snow and ice from public spaces, when done carefully.

When we grit

From October to April, we work with the Met Office to monitor weather conditions around the clock and our 43 gritting crews are on call 24/7. The decision to grit is based on forecasts for winter weather, road surface temperature, dampness of road surface, air temperature and humidity. When we grit, we try to do so either before ice has set or once snow has settled so that it has the best chance of working. Be aware that high-purity white salt is not always visible on the road.

Why roads might still be icy

Even when we've gritted a road, it doesn't mean it won't be icy. This is because:

- It takes time for the salt to take effect
- High winds or sudden rain can take salt off the road
- If the road surface temperature drops to below -7°C, gritting becomes much less
- effective
- If the road surface temperature drops to below -15°C, gritting doesn't work at all
