

## The importance of MPOWDERY

Pre ride checks- Coolant. I had an overheating problem on my 82,000 mile Pan 1300 a week ago. Investigations revealed a coolant leak from the water pump cover, not obvious as pre-ride checks have consistently shown my expansion tank to be full. Indeed, it was still full after my overheating problem. Pan 1300's have a reputation of generating some heat and so on the fateful practice to the Wave from Coningsby I had not noticed anything untoward until a wave of steam enveloped the rear of the bike once I arrived. Moral if you want to check your coolant level check it at the Radiator of course when engine is cold. That is of course assuming you have access to it. So, were there any other signs? Well yes - on return to my Workshop /stable block there was a small damp patch in evidence on the floor. I hadn't ridden for 3 weeks having been

away in the U.S.A. but I suspect the fluid has been disappearing for a while. Moral there is more than one way to check your coolant but the expansion vessel isn't one of them so use all your powers of observation.

## RAMBLING ON

Another article from 1987 by Ken Braithwaite, on Roadcraft, curated by John Harrison

#### Braking.

The most important lesson when learning to ride a motorcycle (or drive any motor vehicle for that matter), is how to stop safely. If I can leave the serious side of this for a moment to tell you about one of my colleagues who was on an instructors course. He was going through an exercise of teaching someone who had never ridden a motorcycle before. The course instructor was acting as the pupil, Dave (for that was his name) told the pupil how to start the bike, then how to engage 1<sup>st</sup> gear and set off. The pupil released the clutch and was riding across the yard at the driving school, acting the part, a bit wobbly, but not too bad, Dave told him to stop. But he had not told him how to stop, so the pupil kept going, straight though a hedge, and fell off. "Why didn't you stop" shouted Dave. "Because I didn't know how. You never told me" said the pupil. Poor Dave, they had him in tears, but he learned a valuable lesson. NEVER expect that what to do is obvious is necessarily as obvious to someone else.

When considering the braking efficiency of the machine, we must also consider the efficiency of the rider. The reaction time or thinking distance. RoadCraft tells us that thinking distance will vary in three ways. With the speed of the machine. With the physical and mental condition of the rider. With the degree of concentration being applied.

Then we have the rules for braking

- 1; Brake firmly only when travelling in a straight line.
- 2; Brake in plenty of time.
- 3; Vary brake pressure according to the conditions of the road.
- 4; When descending a steep winding hill, brake firmly on the straight stretches and ease off on the bends. Remember the value of engaging a low gear at an early stage of the decent.
- 5; Avoid using the front brake when the machine is banked over, turning or on loose or hazardous surfaces. Gear Changing.

The first-class rider should always aim:

- a; To be in the correct gear for every road speed and traffic situation.
- b; To make all gear changes quietly and smoothly.
- c; To know the approximate maximum road speed in each gear of the machine he is riding.

When considering the use of gears, we must remember that we should always match the road speed and the engine revs to the gear selected, so that when the clutch lever is released, there is no sudden rise or fall of engine revs. Any such rise or fall can cause skidding on loose or slippery surfaces and cause unnecessary wear on the whole drive system, from engine, through the clutch, gearbox chain or shaft, to wear on the rear tyre. We must change to a lower gear only when either the road speed has dropped below the speed at which the engine can pull without strain or when approaching a hazard, a more flexible gear is required, or when descending a steep hill, to make use of the engine as a brake. This is to assist the brakes over a long period to control the speed of the machine. We also consider the use of a lower gear to reduce speed when the road surface is slippery, when application of the brakes may result in skidding, as on ice, but it is still important that engine and road speed are matched as the gear is selected.

#### Acceleration Sense.

This is the ability of the rider to vary the speed of the machine by accurate use of the throttle control to meet the changing road and traffic conditions. This part of riding skill can be developed to a fine art with practice. It is essential to read to read the road and traffic conditions well ahead to prefect good acceleration sense, in order to avoid rushing up to obstacles at too high a speed and then having to brake. On many occasions, late planning

can result in a slower rate of progress than the smooth approach that acceleration sense gives. A few m.p.h. lost in early on the approach can allow the hazard ahead to clear before arrival, but if we rush to the hazard at too high a speed, we may arrive before it has cleared and we have to slow down even more or come to a stop. The result is that we have to pick up from a slow speed after the hazard has cleared, whereas the rider who has good acceleration sense arrives at a higher speed as the hazard clears and is able to maintain a better overall rate of progress.

## I. P. S. ? . A.

Well why the missing "G" from our well known and may I say loved IPSGA.

It has come to my notice recently that some riders especially those riding machines with high or very high torque engines are negotiating bends in too high gear with the consequence that they tend to ride wide on the exit of the bend.

On a right bend this can lead to the rider "going agricultural", but on a left bend has the more disastrous consequence of meeting another vehicle head on.

These machines with high torque engines i.e. large capacity twin cylinder and touring motorcycles of all engine configurations, tend to make the rider a little lazy when it comes to changing gear. We should remember that the manufacturers design the motorcycle to enhance our riding, but not to replace our skills.

It is important that we select the **correct** gear at the fourth phase of IPSGA too high and we risk running wide, too low and we may run out of acceleration before completing the curve (not so serious).

We know about that hoary subject the vanishing point VP (my preferred term) or limit point call what you may it's the same, but are we interpreting its message to us correctly?

Most are getting the position correct, but are we getting the speed correct quite a few do, so what goes wrong.

It's the correct selection of gear.

We need to keep an eye on the VP the whole time, what's it doing? Still moving away staying the same distance or are we closing on it, it's imperative that we select the right gear, one that gives us decent acceleration during the 5<sup>th</sup> phase.

The correct gear will enable us to keep the motorcycle on the correct side of the road and be able to remain there without running wide, and will assist us in being able to stop the machine in the distance we can see to be clear.

So, let's start using more of the gears in the box, most tend to ride in too high a gear most of the time, try to keep the rev counter in the middle of the rev range to maintain tractability, keeping those high gears for motorways and dual carriageways with fewer and gentler bends.

Come on put the "G" back into IPSGA

#### Road signs and markings



Road signs and markings provide warnings about approaching hazards, and instructions and information about road use. They need to be incorporated into your riding plan as early as possible. To make the best possible use of road signs and markings you should follow the steps below.

- **Observe** actively search for road signs and markings in your observation scans, and incorporate the information they give you into your riding plan. Many drivers and riders fail to see and make use of them, and so lose valuable information.
- **Understand** be able to recognise them immediately. You should be familiar with the current edition of the *Highway Code* and *Know your traffic signs* book. Everyone's memory declines over time, so check your recall of road signs and markings on a regular basis.
- **React** react to a sign or marking by looking ahead to see what it refers to and building the information into your riding plan. Where the sign or marking refers to an unseen hazard, anticipate the hazard and adapt your plan accordingly.

The observer team is always available for any member of the group who would like to have a one to one in order to maintain their program of continuous personal improvement. The Sunday morning group observed run is a great opportunity to take full advantage of this free service for any member just ask any of the Observer team, and as we have three more group observed runs before the year end there is still plenty of opportunity or if you fancy taking your riding skills to the next level consider becoming a IMI Qualified Local Observer.
