# Ramble on - Cornering

Another article by Ken Braithwaite that has been printed in the Newsletter over the past years, here reprinted again, it is just as relevant today as it was when it was first printed; this one is from December '87.

This month we look at the subject of cornering. It is the part of motorcycle riding which can give the greatest pleasure or the greatest fear and danger, depending on whether you get it right or wrong. It is essential therefore to get it right. Everything must be planned and set up before we get to the corner. So that, having got to the corner, all we have to do is ride round it.

### Principles.

- 1. Correct positioning of the machine on the approach side.
- 2. Right chose of speed.
- 3. Correct gear for the speed.
- 4. The machine to maintain a constant speed when negotiating the curve.

### Safety Factors.

By the application of these principles, the following safety factors will be apparent as the machine is about to leave the bend or corner.

- 1. It will be on the correct side of the road.
- 2. It will be able to remain there.
- 3. It will be capable of being stopped in the distance the rider can see to be clear.

We are all aware of the system of motorcycle control on the approach to a bend.

**Feature1,** of course, is to the near side on the approach to a right-hand bend and towards the centre line on the approach to a left-hand bend. This positioning extends the view around the bend. It extends the radius of the bend and makes a shallower curve.

**Feature 2,** speed, which should be such that the above safety factors are catered for, most important of which and often most neglected, is safety factor 3, and when we are talking about seeing in this context. It is essential that we include seeing the road surface in this, not just other road users, so that we can allow for changes in the road surface, the loose chippings, the wet leaves, the mud, the surveying studs, manhole covers, the things that fall off the back of lorries (at this time of year, sugar beet). The list is endless.

**Feature 3,** Gear. The correct gear must be selected for the speed. The gear selected should be such that the engine is capable of pulling the machine round the curve. Too high a gear can affect the stability of the machine.

The difference between cars and motorcycles in relation to this subject is that a car will travel around curves, balancing itself and its ability to go around is largely based on the design of the car. Other factors, such as road surface, camber, severity of the bend, tyres, etc, are the same for both, the rider of a motorcycle becomes part of the steering and suspension balance, when negotiating a curve, and it is this aspect which makes us enjoy our motorcycling, to feel part of the machine.

Cornering is one of the first disciplines of advanced riding that I like to tackle with my associates, I think that if they can observe the information around them and position themselves correctly on a country road, this seems to pay its dividends later in the Advanced Course. I use the same piece of road each

time, because it contains numerous kinks and bends, no two are alike and it is short enough to retrace after a debrief. The main faults are, their position for bends, most do not all the road available to them, not getting into position early enough and riding through the kinks as if it was a bend, plus the fact that they are usually not in the correct gear.

The following is with no opposing traffic or other hazards on the road. No two bends are identical to each other, so each bend needs to be assessed on its own merits, good forward observation and cross views are essential, which is looking as far into the distance as possible then back to the road surface in front of them, this gives you your riding plan, if the position is taken as early as possible, for the prevailing circumstances, this takes out the exaggerated line taken from the default position and is much smoother. For a left-hand bend select position near to the centre line of the road, with a right-hand bend move close to nearside as the road surface will allow.

Once in position, the main thing they have to concentrate on is the severity of the bend and the place they can start to see through the bend, maintain this position until the limit point of vision starts to move away from them, relative to their own speed. When they can see this happen, gently increase the acceleration; taking a curved line to the apex of the bend, on the right-hand bend use the centre line, not the opposite verge. If no acceleration is applied the machine will lose momentum and fall into the bend, if the limit point starts to come back to them, ease off the throttle until it again starts to move away from them, then apply more throttle again. When at the apex the machine will be pointing in the direction they will be travelling, so they can firmly accelerate away to take up their next position. This will increase their view and reduces the severity of the bend, plus it increases the stability of the machine.

If traffic or a hazard is present take a less pronounced position that takes you on a safe course and lose some speed, this will assist with assessing the severity of the bend. Your braking must be completed and the correct gear to accelerate away from the bend must be chosen before entering the bend.

On the kinks and slight bends that can be seen through, that is the road surface can be seen from verge to verge. There is no need to move for position as they can see the entire road in front of them, so a straighter line can be taken through the bend, not crossing the centre line if to the right and set a course for the next new position, whether it be another bend or hazard.

The last Observers meeting of 2018 was another well attended evening with many members of the team travelling from all areas of the county.

It was a busy evening with many varied Observing subjects discussed throughout the evening. Thanks go to John Harrison for putting together an exceedingly hard quiz for the end of year meeting, and a prize for the winning team.

This month the Observer team would like to welcome James Taylor to the group. James will be working towards the IMI Local Observer qualification.

The team would also like to congratulate Phill Niner on completing the IAM Radio Skills competency.



Many of the team are still out on the road working with their associates. Valued skills and knowledge can still be gained when winter riding. Remember when scanning, that winter time gives us an added advantage created when some hedges and trees drop their foliage; USE that advantage to gain an early view of any potential hazards.

If you don't get an opportunity to get out with your Observer, use your time to increase your knowledge of your Advanced Rider handbook plus Highway code to make sure that you know your theory towards your Advanced test, and when you meet up with your Observer you will not only impress them with your knowledge, you will also very quickly be back on track.

### Micro climates



Ice and wetness can linger in areas of shadow

At this time of the year, when we are keen to fire up the machine and get some miles in, it's often worth thinking about the possibility of Micro climates.

Take time to look out for Micro climates which can cause frost and wet patches to linger in some areas after they have disappeared elsewhere. Landscape features such as valley bottoms, shaded hillsides and shaded slopes, or large areas of shadow cast by trees or buildings can cause ice to linger and result in sudden loss of control.

Bridge surfaces are often colder than the surrounding roads because they are exposed on all sides and can be icy when nearby roads are not. Thorough scanning of the road surface, surrounding area and adapting to what is observed is essential for safe riding. Be aware that Micro climates can occur at any time of the year.

So, if you are planning any rides during the winter, consider a look at the Lincs county council gritting routes to plan your ride. If heading out of the county, consider looking for similar information from other county councils.

### **Gritting routes**

The county council grits 1,869 miles of priority roads in Lincolnshire when road temperatures drop to around 1°C.

### This includes:

- All A and B roads
- At least one road from each of the county's main villages to a major traffic route
- At least one road within 500m of all train and bus stations, hospitals and schools, where possible
- Additional roads depending on various risk factors, such as historic accident data

For the latest news on the council's gritting operations, follow @LincsCC\_roads on Twitter. The Highways Agency is responsible for gritting all trunk roads in Lincolnshire, including on the A1, the A52 Grantham to Nottingham and the A46 west of Lincoln.

No other roads will be treated, except during severe snow or prolonged icy spells. We do not routinely grit or salt footpaths. However, during severe weather, we work closely with local organisations to clear some steep and well-used pavements.

There is no law preventing people from <u>clearing snow and ice from public spaces</u>, when done carefully.

### When we grit

From October to April, we work with the Met Office to monitor weather conditions around the clock and our 43 gritting crews are on call 24/7.

The decision to grit is based on forecasts for winter weather, road surface temperature, dampness of road surface, air temperature and humidity.

When we grit, we try to do so either before ice has set or once snow has settled so that it has the best chance of working. Be aware that high-purity white salt is not always visible on the road.

### Why roads might still be icy

Even when we've gritted a road, it doesn't mean it won't be icy. This is because:

- It takes time for the salt to take effect
- High winds or sudden rain can take salt off the road
- If the road surface temperature drops to below -7°C, gritting becomes much less effective
- If the road surface temperature drops to below -15°C, gritting doesn't work at all
