Practice, Practice!

To become proficient as an Advanced rider it is important that you continue to practice your Advanced riding skills. This is relevant at any level, Associate, Full member, Observer, Fellow; Masters, the learning never stops. On your next ride out take time to self analyse your ride. Ask yourself, am I ridding at an Advanced level? Could I have done something different to improve my ride? Where is my vision? Use your eyes to build up a picture of what is happening all around you, as far as you can see, in every direction. The best way to build up this picture is to use your eyes in a scanning motion which sweeps the whole environment: the distance, the mid-ground, the foreground, the sides and rear. You might find that there is some room for improvement.

The LAM Sunday morning Group ride out is a great opportunity for associate members to get in some extra riding practice before their Advanced test. At the Sunday morning ride you will usually find many Observers and Full members who have got a vast knowledge and experience of Advanced riding who are always willing to assist others to achieve test standard. It is also another opportunity to practice the work that you have been doing with your Observer. We have three areas of the county covered, so take a look in the events diary and plan your next Sunday morning Group ride!


Five things to be doing before your Advanced test

1. Read and review all sections of your Advanced Rider Course book;

- HUMAN FACTORS
- CORE RIDING SKILLS
- BENDS & CORNERING

- 2. Read & know your Highway code!
- 3. Demonstrate your Pre-ride **MPOWDERY** checks to a high standard
- 4. Review all your Course Run sheets; are there any weak parts that need extra practice?
- 5. Get out on your bike and practice your new skills so that they become second nature to your ride.

Gritting routes

The county council grits 1,869 miles of priority roads in Lincolnshire when road temperatures drop to around 1°C.

This includes:

- All A and B roads
- At least one road from each of the county's main villages to a major traffic route
- At least one road within 500m of all train and bus stations, hospitals and schools, where possible
- Additional roads depending on various risk factors, such as historic accident data

For the latest news on the council's gritting operations, follow @LincsCC roads on Twitter. The Highways Agency is responsible for gritting all trunk roads in Lincolnshire, including on the A1, the A52 Grantham to Nottingham and the A46 west of Lincoln.

No other roads will be treated, except during severe snow or prolonged icy spells. We do not routinely grit or salt footpaths. However, during severe weather, we work closely with local organisations to clear some steep and well-used pavements.

There is no law preventing people from <u>clearing snow and ice from public spaces</u>, when done carefully.

When we grit

From October to April, we work with the Met Office to monitor weather conditions around the clock and our 43 gritting crews are on call 24/7.

The decision to grit is based on forecasts for winter weather, road surface temperature, dampness of road surface, air temperature and humidity.

When we grit, we try to do so either before ice has set or once snow has settled so that it has the best chance of working. Be aware that high-purity white salt is not always visible on the road.

Why roads might still be icy

Even when we've gritted a road, it doesn't mean it won't be icy. This is because:

- It takes time for the salt to take effect
- High winds or sudden rain can take salt off the road
- If the road surface temperature drops to below -7°C, gritting becomes much less effective
- If the road surface temperature drops to below -15°C, gritting doesn't work at all

DEALING WITH PARKED MOTORCYCLE SYNDROME

As 2019 dawns, I like to discuss an illness known to afflict many motorcyclists – PMS or Parked Motorcycle Syndrome.

The symptoms of PMS have been well documented and with a cure so readily available, why do so many motorcyclists suffer in silence?

Does the motorcyclist in your life...

- Yell at weather forecasters on television.
- Put on their helmet in the house.
- Curse each day of winter.
- Regard home as a prison.
- Tell you to 'Shusssssh', whenever a motorcycle can be heard.
- Sit looking east for hours on end, drinking, waiting for spring, like a character in a Russian novel.

As the condition worsens, the afflicted individual becomes utterly listless, attempts to live in the garage, finds spurious maintenance tasks that must be completed with all urgency; loosening and retighten random bolts to make sure they are torqued correctly, and responds to questions by making motorcycle sounds.

In the final stages of PMS, motorcycles have been found parked in front of televisions, with MotoGP reruns and "The Long Way Round" on a continuous loop.

To offset the debilitating effects of PMS, encourage the Motorcyclist in your life to, spend hours at the computer planning trips, mapping out routes and setting an agenda. If the motorcyclist responds to this treatment, encourage them to check the quality of the tarmac by "riding" the routes via Google Street View.

What can you do to help?

Scouring YouTube for trip videos made by other motorcyclists and using "active listening" techniques when the motorcyclist in your life goes off into another ramble about how good it is going to be when the summer comes, are all known to lessen the symptoms of PMS.

But at the heart of it all is the need to un-park the motorcycle.

In these busy times, it is easy to overlook the needs of the motorcyclist in your life. Do what you can to encourage them to open the garage door and embrace those dry winter days.

Points to Ponder

Years ago there was a column in a magazine I read called "Points to Ponder" – Thought something similar might work in the magazine. With that in mind ... see below ©

Meeting up a few days after an invigorating weekend ride across the Lincolnshire Wolds, a colleague explained his encounter with the ubiquitous "white-van-man".

After the final tea and coke stop, we went our different ways which involved my colleague filtering down the outside of a queue of traffic. The traffic was waiting to pass some long established roadworks on a wide single carriage-way road. Having filtered successful to about the half way point, he was just alongside white-van-man when from stationary, our van driver decided it was time to turn right, out of the line of traffic.

A rapid application of brakes and a solid thump on the side of the van with his fist, all while maneuvering to avoid white-van-man, prevented any unwanted conclusion to the incident.

Filtering is a privilege for a motorcyclist not a right. We get to avoid waiting in line and not everyone is going to see filtering as something to be celebrated. How many of us have seen a car move to block the gap?

Constant awareness and reading of the situation are necessary to ensure we maintain our safety bubble. Accepting that reasonable precaution was taken when filtering, what more could have been taken from the situation to be ready for White-Van-Man?

A pathological hatred of all vans isn't a bad place to start. The foundation for this approach is that often the van isn't owned or insured by the driver. The driver is at work and the sooner they get to where they are going, the sooner the job is done and the sooner they are finished for the day.

This led me to a couple of other thoughts. Do vans after 3 pm have a higher risk rating? It is getting closer to the end of their day, which might add to their impatience level. Should I give vans at weekends even more consideration? Perhaps the driver is on overtime or a call out when the driver would rather be at home? Add in the after 3 pm rule and should a van, after 3 pm on the weekend be considered the devil incarnate?

There isn't any scientific fact or empirical evidence in my theory, and to be politically correct I should point out that there might be considerate van drivers out there somewhere. Regardless, I seem to be assessing vans, especially the white ones, with renewed vigour when I come across them.
