The prime purpose is to provide the opportunity to hone /improve skills through riding with fellow members.

Potential members considering taking the IAM test may have an individual assessment ride.

Runs last usually around two hours, often with a mid-point refreshment stop.

Depending on numbers / balance etc., it is customary for different groupings to embark on a run style of their choice as they feel fit.

The main purpose is to have the opportunity to ride with fellow like-minded bikers.

The starting points are as shown below:

Ancholme Leisure Centre, Scawby Brook, Brigg, DN20 9JH South side of A18

Willingham Woods Picnic Site, LN8 3RQ East of Market Rasen A631

Hartsholme Country Park Cafe, Lincoln, LN6 0EY South side of B1378, Skellingthorpe Road

Group Social Runs will incorporate café stops unless an alternative is specified. Please try to arrive at the meeting point in good time and with a full tank of fuel. Please let the run organizer know if you want to invite a guest. If carrying a pillion passenger, you should ensure that this is covered by your motorcycle insurance policy.

It is you, as the rider who is deemed to be in control of your motorcycle at all times during an observed or social run.

2020 - a year of vision

February was the first Observers indoor training meeting of 2020. It was a busy evening with all the team working through many different items throughout the session. Winter can still be our friend

As we move into March and the clocks go forward on the 29th moving us into British summer time we can thank winter for giving us the opportunity to gain an information advantage by still being able to see through hedges that have shed their leaves during the winter. Safe and effective riding depends on using the information gained from early observation to plan your riding actions. Gaining an advantage by good early observation is a vital part of your Information stage. Don't miss these clues... When you approach a hazard where your view is restricted, position your bike to get the best view that is consistent with safety. Take every opportunity, however brief, to improve your observation of the converging roads and the road ahead.

Take time to look for these features.....



Take a close look at this picture. What can be seen? By taking advantage of early observations through the gap in the dormant hedge, you can spot coming in the other direction at a similar distance to the bend as us, a silver crew cab towing a horse box.

Now take a close look at this picture. What can be seen? The clues are there. Early observations through the gap warns us of the approaching white vehicle in good time before we have even arrived

at the crossroads ahead. By looking across a bend or through gaps, Advanced riders can better plan how to deal with hazards; you may see vehicles and or further hazards.....



The clues are there, work on sharpening your vision to boost your Information stage.

Dragon Rally 2020



The semi-legendary souvenir slate coaster

Wikipedia tells us that the Dragon Rally is a motorcycle camping rally held annually during winter in North Wales since 1962, making it one of the UK's longest running bike events. In the 1960's the attendance at the Dragon sometimes topped 3,000 riders; more recently the figure ranged from 1,500 to 2,000 depending on the weather and location. The rally is famed for its toughness and spartan facilities. Riders often must endure miserable riding conditions to attend the rally and, once on site, they are expected to camp without regard to the weather conditions. It is an event held in veneration by large numbers of motorcyclists as a test of stamina and endurance because (in the first two decades at least) it was common to have to endure snow and ice to ride there. The Dragon is often grouped with the German Elephant Rally and the Norwegian Krystal Rally. You send off your entry fee and two stamped addressed envelopes to the Conwy motorcycle club when entries open in about October, and thence receive your tickets and directions to the rally checkpoint. This practice dates back to the days when motorcyclists were rowdy young blades, and it was felt necessary to have some way of filtering out the rougher element. These days you just get a warning about the level of physical fitness needed to camp in mid-winter in North Wales.

This year's rally was staged at Capel-y-Graig which is about a mile from the New Menai Bridge, Sir Gwynedd but more of the later. This year was a combined Lincoln and Cornwall Advanced event with Nick, my brother (your editor) on his Honda NC700s, and Master of Riding Tim Collins with his immaculate Honda ST1300 Pan European and me on my Honda Crosstourer participating. We met at Bath for the 3rd year running and spent a convivial evening taking my 93-year-old Aunt for a meal in a local hostelry. Saturday morning dawned bright and dry and we set off in good spirits with a fine breakfast inside!

Making our way via the Prince of Wales Bridge and Abergavenny to Cwmdru and a coffee stop at the Myndd Ddu tea rooms where along with the most excellent Bara Brith (for our cake fans, Bara Brith, sometimes known as "speckled bread", is a yeast bread either enriched with dried fruit or made with self-raising flour. It is traditionally flavoured with tea, dried fruits and mixed spices, and is served sliced and buttered) the café has visor cleaner and anti-fogging spray free to use. After this short break we continued along the A479, A470 and A489 to the Caffi Draig in Llanbryn-mair, a pit-stop Cafe on the A470 with small play barn, gift shop, rabbit village(!) and an exhibition space with a good selection of clock-work automata. Good place to stop on your journey, a little bit of something for everyone especially hungry bikers. After lunch we continue north ward to the Swallow Falls Inn and the Dragon Check in desk

The check in caravan furnished us validation of the tickets, a sticker (a number 59 to indicate the 59th year of the rally) and directions to the camp site, 21 miles distant on a bleak hill side at Capel-y-Graig. Parking on the approach road we walked up to the marquee and collected our pin badge, coaster and goody bag. Refreshed

with a mug of hot soup and a bread bun we trudged back down the muddy track to the bikes. This track was a good test of what might be comfortably be considered a bike with off-road capability, although some hardy souls had managed to manipulate Gold Wings and similar mile-munchers up onto the camp site.

Now the confession: after a close run in with hyperthermia 2 years ago discretion overcame valour and we next made our way to the Premier Inn in Caernarfon. Warm room, comfy bed and hot meal beer and Breakfast.

Meeting up at 0800 on Sunday morning storm Ciara was with us, after breakfast we packed up the bikes and discovering we couldn't stand still in the storm force wind; went back into to the restaurant and inveigled a second breakfast on the house!

At 1000 the storm hadn't abated but at 1100 Nick commented "look the boats in the marina aren't moving so much", and indeed the wind had dropped to a slight hooley! We set off in good heart, and relatively calm conditions until we got to Llanberis. The power cables were decorated with a substantial tree branch draped over them, and we picked our way through the town accompanied by items of rubbish easily keeping up with us as they were blown along the street and the water falls at the bottom of the Llanberis pass were being blown back up the mountainside. Climbing up over the Llanberis pass, we could hear the roar of the wind coming behind us and suddenly the bike shot from the near side of the road to the off-side with no input from me (other than a strange warming of my pants). Very cautiously we made our way over the pass negotiating a roof in the road at Pen-y-Pass and down the mountain A5 to Betws-y-Coed, here the road was closed at the Waterloo Bridge due to a flood with a car stuck in the middle of it, but what's an adventure bike for, so negotiating the waters which were well over my feet we found our way through (later Tim said he was blowing bubbles with the exhausts on the Pan well under the water!) We continued along the A5 to Llangollen where Nick turned East for Lincoln and Tim and I South West to the Farm-shop services at Gloucester.

The weather was blustery with many fallen trees and a lot of standing water these 167 miles had taken 5 hours. Resting and replenishing the inner man we set off down the M5 corridor to discover the Ciara had not passed through the Southwest yet, we suffered severe buffeting and frequent squalls of rain with the riding speed to to 50 MPH at time (but still well within the flow of traffic). I was finally at home by 1930 taking 7 ½ hours to ride 340 miles so an average speed of 45.33 MPH
Will we do it again, why of course! Next year sees the 60th Dragon rally Not going to miss that one!
