Family tribute for Keith Smith.

Keith very sadly died following a collision on 6 October 2021 at Lissington.

Keith left home on his trusted motorbike, to make the most of the good weather and have a cup of tea at Willingham Woods. Unfortunately, he never made it home and this is the worst tragedy ever for our family to lose him in such unbelievable circumstances; we are all so devastated.

Keith was a much loved husband, father, brother, brother-in-law, granddad, uncle and friend. He was well respected and loved in many different communities, including Karate (for over 40 years), trials bike riding, the Lincoln branch of the Triumph owners club and the Institute of Advanced Motorcycle training (IAM). He was first and foremost a family man, he was an engineer, intelligent, intellectual, he was a deep thinker and would be calculated and calm in everything he did.

He had a passion for motorbikes almost his entire life, from the age of 12-years-old. He covered hundreds of thousands of miles over the years on his motorbike, mostly with his wife of almost 50 years, as a pillion. He'd also covered tens of thousands of miles on his bicycle. He enjoyed keeping his mind and body fit and healthy.

We'll remember him with such love and affection. He was always there for family and friends, no matter what the situation was. Keith was our rock, the man who was always dependable, reliable and on time. He was always busy with a project and always on the go. He was successful in whatever he turned his hand to, be it family life, work or hobbies.

Keith was our hero, such a quiet, loving, unassuming man and we'll miss him forever.


Editorial

This month's sad news of the loss of life of Keith Smith in a tragic riding accident has been a big blow for many members of LAM and the Observer team. Keith gave up a lot of his time for LAM, he was always at the Sunday morning Observed rides, always supported the social rides where ever they ended up and was also a loyal, conscientious member of the Observer team. Keith will be sincerely missed by LAM members and all in the Observer team.

Some of the LAM Observer team have been out working with members of Lincolnshire Emergency Blood Bikes service this month. The LAM Observers have been conducting 3 year riding assessments for the LEBBS riders, thank you to all that have given their time and also thanks go to South Lines Advanced Motorcyclists who have also assisted with some riders in the south of the county. This is currently an on going program and we are honoured to be supporting LEBBS.

It would be great to see a few more associates joining the Sunday morning Group Observed ride. The morning ride usually lasts a couple of hours and usually has a half time refreshment break. It is open to full members and associate members. The prime purpose is to provide the opportunity to hone and improve skills through riding with fellow members.

What can I expect if I go? Ive not joined the Sunday morning Observed ride before, is it for me? Will I be out of my comfort zone? These a commonly asked questions. You can expect to meet many like minded riders there who have got many years of Advanced riding (and cake eating) and are always happy to assist others with training to be safer smoother riders and achieve the best results with the Advanced test.

It is open to all associate members, what ever level of your course that you are at. We only ride in



small groups of up to six riders, heading off to different local destinations. There is a pre-ride brief by the ride leader and Observer if available. If you haven't ridden with a small group before, the ride leader will explain everything that you need to know before the ride. Safety is paramount and your group will not leave any rider behind, the rider in front of you will be keeping an eye on you and adjusting their riding to ride at your pace. This is a really great opportunity to put the work that you have done with your Observer into action, also you will have an advantage of following another Advanced rider, a lot can be gained from these rides, also you get to meet other associates and see how they are getting on with their course. It is free to all, its your group, come and enjoy the ride.

We have two more Observed rides before the end of the year, 7<sup>th</sup> November from the WAVE cafe and 12<sup>th</sup> December from Brigg (see full details in the events diary) All associates that attend either of these rides will have their name put into a hat to have a chance to win on the day ONE of LAM's super new Beanie Hats, Oooooo nice just in time for winter I hear you say.......See you there!

This month Observer John Harrison talks about white paint and surface grip.

#### Rambling On Grey bits

Some more little bits of wisdom that I share with my associates. Again not things that get to hit the headlines in advanced riding as they did a good few years ago.

What happens when white paint and black rubber meet each other on the road?

Answer, white paint and black rubber do not mix well especially in the wet and this becomes a bit of a grey area.

Today white markings on the road are not as heavily laid down and have a much better skid resistance than they did years ago. As with most of my little stories go back 30 years, a lad got off his bike and was limping rather badly and I ask "what have you been up to then" it turned out that the

chap going to turn right, oncoming traffic, so had to come to a halt unfortunately on the white painted area of a zebra crossing, damp day, a bit of the slimy stuff on the surface, sets off, back wheel slips and then steps out on to the tarmac, tyre then grips, then on to the white paint again, slides even more, result one heavily bruised hip, a new brake lever and indicator. But with modern rubber still some tyres do react to white lines and road markings and if push comes to shove, having to brake, steer or set off on wet white markings may induce the tyre to skid, so it's better to avoid the paint, even when dry.





Another thing that meets a similar criteria are manhole covers, the modern ones are now made of ductile iron that has a better flow quality when molten than the older cast iron, which allows better surface castings to be made, plus they have fewer stress points in them, so they are less likely to become polished or cracked. The only thing is that all the old cast iron ones have not all been replaced, also gone are most of the glass topped manhole covers which when damp where like riding over a patch of ice. Even with the better quality cast tops they are not as good a surface as the

tarmac, but they are still mainly all 2 feet wide, this means that you only have to modify your course by about 12 inches to stay on the black stuff and in the wet they are not the best surface to corner or brake on, as well as the fact they may be uneven or have sunk, so it's far better to avoid them all together.

When I started with advanced riding white lines and manhole covers where a no go area and one had to keep to the black stuff and only to run on the white paint when necessary, such as stop line markings and overtaking in double white line systems when the broken white line was in your favour. On the open road



you used the spaces between the lines and on the SLOW markings, over the bottom and top of the O or over the foot and up beside the leg of the L, unless there was enough room to pass to the side of them. Even though on the boxer, I seem to remember that I was quite good at keeping it on the black stuff, as the bonnie had a TT 100 on the front and was a bit twitchy at the best of times.

One more thing worth a mention are cat eyes, many years ago on the A 46, a lad was completing an overtake, and was fatally injured when he came off the road. At the inquest the driver of the car stated that he was not speeding and as he returned to his side of the road he lost control of his bike. The investigation of the incident revealed that the front wheel had run over a cat's eye coursing the rider to loss control of the motorcycle.

Potential members considering taking the IAM test may have an individual assessment ride.

Runs last usually around two hours, often with a mid-point refreshment stop.

Depending on numbers / balance etc., it is customary for different groupings to embark on a run style of their choice as they feel fit. The main purpose is to have the opportunity to ride with fellow like-minded bikers.

The starting points are as shown below:

Ancholme Leisure Centre, Scawby Brook, Brigg, DN20 9JH South side of the A18

Willingham Woods Picnic Site, LN8 3RQ East of Market Rasen A631

Waddington Airfield Viewing Area (WAVE) LN5 9FF East side of the A15

Group Social Runs will incorporate café stops unless an alternative is specified. Please try to arrive at the meeting point in good time and with a full tank of fuel. Please let the run organiser know if you want to invite a guest. If carrying a pillion passenger, you should ensure that this is covered by your motorcycle insurance policy.

It is you, as the rider who is deemed to be in control of your motorcycle at all times during an observed or social run.
