As I mentioned there have been a few rides this month starting with the monthly observed ride and in February it started in the North of the group area at Brigg. There we 18 of us there, Jerry went off for a run with his associate David, and Stuart and Michelle went and did their own thing.



That left 10 full members, two observers and two associates. We split into two groups each with an observer and associate and headed in opposite directions. Ken Mulholland took his group north out in the Goole direction and I took the other group up and over the Wolds finishing up at Willingham Woods.

It was great to see two associates (Rob and Laurance) who haven't even had their first rides with their observers yet. Thanks to Ian and Will for guiding them and to Ken for the lead, just as

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Observer and Associate

February was the first meeting of 2023 for the LAM Observer team. It was great to be back, many subjects were worked through during the evening session. Thanks go to all that could make it, and thanks also go to Observer Ian Morrison for preparing our subject of the month at short notice.

Associates that haven't been out for a while, it would be great to see you, there are some good days even at this time of the year to get out riding, if you pick your days right. Most of the Observer team ride all year round so a quick call or message to your Observer should see you back on with your Advanced test preparation runs.

This month the Observer team would like to welcome John Travis and Stevie Johnson to the LAM Observer team, both John and Stevie will be working towards achieving the IMI Observer qualification.

Lets talk 'Concentration'

Following on from last months article about needing to be on our 'A game' at all times, this month let's look at concentration and how it plays a very large and vital part of our riding. In the Advanced Rider Course book concentration is part of our Human factors section, it refers to one of the personal qualities or behaviours that any Advanced rider must demonstrate;

To always maintain concentration while riding

Concentration is defined as: The action or power of focusing all one's 'attention' (Oxford English Dictionary)

Advanced riders should be able to focus on their riding while disregarding any unrelated factors.

As Advanced riders we have to take in a very large amount of information to make our safe riding plans-such as pedestrians, cyclists, other vehicles, road signs and road surface conditions are just a few that all demand our concentration. A great tool to improve your concentration level is to give yourself a commentary while you are riding – describing the road and traffic hazards that arise, and what you propose to do about them, this can be a great way to keep you focused and looking out for other road users possible lapse of concentration.

In 2017, driver distraction was a factor in more than 4500 accidents resulting in injuries. 125 of these were fatal (source AA)


So as Advanced riders it is vital that we watch for other distracted road users. According to the AA research, nearly 70% of drivers have their minds on other things while they're driving. Overall, 50% of drivers worry about arriving on time, 1 in 3 are thinking about work, and 25% are distracted by planning for the future!

Let's consider why we need to concentrate to gain early information on other road users movements and actions, place yourself on a very busy four lane roundabout, where is the concentration level of all the other road users around you?

Are they:

- Daydreaming, planning what to have for tea tonight, planning the evenings TV viewing
- Food, eating food or drinking with one hand while steering with the other
- Engaged in conversation with passengers in their vehicle
- Looking at Sat Nav screens, and other controls like adjusting the radio or heating and climate controls
- © Engaged in telephone conversations, even with hands free devices
- O Looking elsewhere!

Take a look at this busy junction, what are the other road users concentrating on ?



Same junction, just with a little bit more detail, where is the cyclist on the right, riding through the junction with no hands on the bars and two hands on their mobile device attention, are they concentrating on the road or their device?





Look Mum - No Hands !!!

The IAM estimates that 'driver error' is a contributory cause in a massive 95% of vehicle collisions. Much of that driver error – doing the wrong thing, or not doing the right thing quickly enough – is due to lack of concentration. Even a momentary lapse can be significant. At 70 mph, the maximum legal speed on most motorways and dual carriageways, during a lapse of concentration for just one second you will travel over 100 feet. And whenever there is a collision on a motorway there is almost always a series of shunts or near misses on the opposite carriageway as drivers stop concentrating on their own driving to have a look.

This is why being on our 'A game' with our concentration level is vital when riding.
