
In October last year we marked the tragic passing of one of our Observers (Keith Smith) by holding a memorial ride. I'd like to do something similar again this year. It

could be a longer or shorter ride, you can't please everyone. So please yourself.

So, if someone would like to put something 'out there' let's see if it generates any interest. Any ride to remember him or his contribution to the club, doesn't need to be on that date, just somewhere close.

Note, we have had Observers die in the past while in service and we don't mark those events. We have had members and associates die, on or off a bike and again we don't mark those events.

Keith's passing was on the 6th October, on his bike, totally out of his ability to avoid, not his fault.



Bear with me on this, I'm not passing any opinion in this article on different parts of the UKs decision to reduce some speed limits to 20mph. This debate/change/process is not over by a long way and still creates polarised opinions.

It takes you to a webpage called UK Parliament research briefings.

Click on House of Commons library. (Accept cookies)

Click on search button, top right.

Type 'Road humps and 20mph'

It will return one article, written 01.12.2023.

The Welsh 20mph limit was introduced 17.09.2023



Scroll down to read:

"In a poll carried out in Oct 2023, 59% of Welsh voters said they opposed the change, up from 34% opposition in mid September (before introduction) support for the new, reduced speed limit has correspondingly fallen from 46% to 29%."

Scroll down further, under

"Public support" read:

"...Once the 20mph limit has been implemented a 2018 (that date confuses me!) DFT review of signed only 20mph limits found high levels of support amongst cyclists (81%) residents living in the area with a new 20mph limit (75%) and drivers not resident in the 20mph area (66%) but less support amongst residents of neighbouring areas (44%) and opposition from motorcyclists 29% supportive 49% unsupportive."

What does that say about us (motorcyclists) as a group? It doesn't say what type of motorcyclists were canvassed though.

Transport for London (TFL) press release 21st of May 2025.

TFL undertook analysis of more than 150 20 MPH schemes implemented between 1989 and 2013, to better understand the impact of the schemes over a longer time period.

(After the bullet points)

Paragraph one read: "Compelling new TFL research that the number of people killed and seriously injured on borough roads in London reduced by 34% following the implementation of the 20mph speed limit between 1989 and 2013."

Scroll down to paragraph 3, read:

"TFL carried out this new extensive analysis to fully understand the impact of road safety measures across the city over a long time span. The report shows that, with the exception of motorcycle fatalities which did not change, 20 mile an hour schemes led to fewer deaths and less severe injuries across every mode of travel."

What? Why didn't motorcycle fatalities likewise reduce? This is a statement, not an opinion, but I just don't understand this.

We seem to be the group that resist the reduction in speed limits and are the only group not to benefit from those same reductions. Hey ho.



OBSERVER AND ASSOCIATE

August saw the last evening session of on bike training for the Observer team, as usual a busy evening with many subjects covered by the team in the north and the team in south including the challenges of urban riding when Observing, thanks to the team leaders Alan, Mike and all that could make it. September will see us back in the classroom for our evening session. This month the Observer team would like to welcome Ian Welsh and Steve Mitchell to the team, both Ian and Steve will be working towards the IMI National Observer qualification.

Quite often you will hear me refer to skill fade, which can creep in over time without us realising.

Having a fresh pair of eyes looking at our riding is a great way to address this issue, this could be in the form of joining the IAM RoadSmart Fellow membership and show that you are working to arrest any signs of skill fade with an Advanced Re-test every three years. Or a second great way to consider is to look at the Members Advanced Rider Refresher Course LAMs friendly qualified Observers cover all corners of the county, so wherever you are we have you covered. Lets keep one stage ahead of skill fade here in Lincolnshire!



- Learn 1-to-1 from a highly skilled Observer
- Hone your advanced riding skills in 3-4 sessions
- Refresh your knowledge of IPSGA

The Member's Advanced Rider Refresher a great opportunity for IAM RoadSmart members (past or present) to go out on three to four 60-90 minute rides with a skilled Observer. It may be quite some time since you passed your Advanced test, or you may just want the opportunity to brush up on a few advanced riding skills. All you need is a full valid licence, full membership status and your own motorbike.

About the session

The Member's Advanced Rider Refresher has been designed to focus on maintaining Advanced Riding skills with reference to the competencies in the Advanced Rider Logbook. Your Observer will be able to identify some areas to work on and you will be encouraged to input into the focus of each session to gain the most benefit. There's no test and there's no pressure – just enjoy the sessions!

What's included?

The first session will start with introductions and a discussion of your goals. Sessions 2 and 3 will focus on revision of IPSGA and developing skills individual to the rider. Session 4 is an optional session to recap on learning and bring everything together. The course is likely to take a couple of months depending on how often you meet. Between your sessions, you'll have the opportunity to put into practise your learnings. You will receive a soft copy version of the Logbook.



Are there any additional costs?

Your allocated Observer is a volunteer and will use their own motorcycle when riding with you to deliver the course. LAM request that a contribution is made to the fuel costs incurred by the Observer. A hard copy of the all new 2025 course logbook is also available to purchase. The course is £89 and can be found in courses at iamroadsmart.com or click the link HERE

WALKING IS MORE DANGEROUS THAN MOTORCYCLING

Back in June myself and a couple of mates, Andy and Alan, embarked on a four night trip to North Wales based in Llanberis, Snowdonia. I was on my Triumph 900 GT Pro, Andy on his Honda Africa Twin and Alan on the mighty Honda ADV 750. Our first stop was in Ashbourne at a very nice café called Preston's Specialty Coffee Bar on Derby Road, worth a visit.

We then made our way, via Leek and Macclesfield, to stop two at Chester Services on the M56 for a bit of lunch. It was here that my first misdemeanour took place. Whilst putting my jacket on by the bikes I noticed that my wallet was missing! We looked everywhere and checked to see if it was handed in, anyway I decided that someone must have picked it up and it was gone, nightmare! On the phone to Carol to cancel my credit cards just in case, I felt such



a fool. Alan kindly offered to sub me for the trip, I promised to pay him back later!

Off we went heading for Llanberis along the N.Wales coast, lovely views, until I felt something at my lower back against the pillion seat, it was square, about the size of a wallet! I got the others to pull in off the motorway at the next exit. Jacket off and there was my wallet, in



between the outer fabric and the liner!! I had mistakenly shoved the wallet in the open vent rather than the pocket which is next to it, the wallet had slipped down into the lining. I called Carol and after a few expletives she informed me that all the cards were cancelled. O well, we live and learn.

Moving on, anyway, a nice ride on and down to our Air B&B in Llanberis. Nice and handy for pubs,

restaurants and great views all around. Settled in the Pub, food etc.

Day two was a planned circuit of Anglesey, heavy rain and thunderstorms were forecast so we had a bail out plan. Luckily the storm arrived that evening after we returned. Anglesey was great, hardly any traffic, great roads, café's and views.

On Holyhead we visited South Stack Lighthouse, amazing views back to Snowdonia and nice café / visitor centre.



We popped into the Anglesey race circuit for a looksee and another brew. Formula Ford type cars were there on a track day, looks a great circuit. Back over the lovely Menai bridge and return to base before the heavens opened! Pub, food etc.

Day three was great sunny weather with a planned 100 mile round trip of Snowdonia. It was spectacular from the start, heading up Llanberis Pass and on to Betws-y-Coed, Llanrwst, Ffestiniog, Porthmadog and Caernarfon. You must ride the B4391 sometime, its stunning!

Following a brew near the castle we decided to return via the village on Anglesey with the longest name ever that we missed yesterday,

job eh? We took piccies of the sign along with bus loads of tourists at the station, as you do.

The evening was my second misdemeanour! Following a fish and chip supper we decided to go for a stroll in the local park down by the beautiful lake Llyn Padarn before heading back for a beer. For some unknown reason I felt

the need to jump down a low wall into a concrete rainwater gully and up a similar wall the other side. Upon landing my right knee gave way and I started to go down in a heap, but somehow it came back to life shooting me into the opposite wall headfirst! The contact was hard as it was Welsh slate, so I then had a major gash in my forehead spewing blood in copious amounts. Amazingly, from nowhere, there appeared some folk who were first aiders with all the kit as they had just come back from leading an outward bound course.

I was patched up pretty quick and they stopped the blood flow. That was a lucky break! Someone dialled 999 for an ambulance but it would be 3-6 hrs! One of the group, a lovely lady called Layla, offered to take me to Bangor A&E in her car. She not only took me there but went to a local shop to buy me a few items to survive the waiting room wait. My guardian angel, we still keep in touch. Layla restored my faith in humanity. The boys popped in later with bike mags and other goodies, also free micky taking was thrown in of course!

Following a quick triage my wait was 13 hrs, all night to get stitched up! 8 stitches in the morning and a taxi back to Llanberis wearing a turban! Andy and Alan were there to receive the patient, I told them to go off on ride three as I was off to bed. They had a great day riding down to Lake Vymwy. As I couldn't ride back the next day (turban, stitches and right eye

closing up) as planned I needed to source a van to take me and the bike back home. The AA weren't interested as the bike hadn't broken down, so through a website called Shiply I arranged a flatbed truck to pick up me and the bike next morning for £360, door to door, sorted.

Managed to get my money back, minus £50 excess, through my travel insurance. The chap who brought me back was great, the bike never moved an inch!

So, that was a bit different to our usual tours and not one I wish to repeat! It was all a bit bizarre, not something you could



dream up even. I was lucky as the head injury could have been far worse if I had hit the wall an inch or two either way.

A trip of highs and lows, but still great memories. Planning our next one now!
